A Message From the Board Of Directors

hen you read this I will have only 3 weeks as a Board member, so I decided to share my story. The last 6 weeks have in many weeks been the most difficult

of my life. On December 23, David, my husband fell and broke his hip. The trip from there was: new hip, rehab, fall & back to the hospital, back to rehab, fall back to hospital, also an infection, back to rehab, Covid and back to hospital, and now hopefully back to rehab or maybe even home. So I have had lots of time to be very thankful for the staff and all my friends here who have made this journey bearable.

My story begins in 2004 when we decided we didn't want to do yard work any more and we bought our home in Oceana. The timing was perfect, as 4 months later we were offered a position teaching on cruise ships. This meant that we would be out of the country for at least 4 months of the year. Oceana was perfect, we could just pack our bags and go.

At that time we had a management company. Most things went ok aside from reoccurring billing problems. Our house got painted while we were away, and aside from the use of gallons of bono instead of exterior repairs, it was ok. During a stay at home I decided that the dirt area along one side of my home needed planting. Landscape said they would put in a stepping stone path and plantings. When we came home, some stepping stones had been installed but no plants. Why no plants? There was no more money in the budget. (To this day there is only mulch, they took away the path.) Then we came home on a tight schedule and there were 2 inches of water on our floors. Mopped it up, left the next day for work. When I got home I called maintenance, Ron came out, said the water had come through the cement brick wall and call when it happened again...

Work was slowing down, so I decided to run for the board because I was upset by all the deferred maintenance and lack of care. I did not get elected.

About this time the board decided that the management co. was not doing a good job and we became independent. Eventually someone from landscape suggested we needed a french drain. Engineers were called and a drain was put in and the ouster wall was sealed.

Still feeling I could help Oceana, I ran for the board again in 2016 and got elected. I am so proud of all the board and management have done in these 4 years to begin to fix the problems of our previously deferred maintenance projects.. A painting program has been established that requires that exterior of homes must be repaired before painting, neglected cement block walls have been rebuilt, garages and car sheds have been rebuilt and re-roofed, broken driveways have been repaved, metal railings have replaced old wooden ones. We have begun new projects like putting a safer floor surface in the club house, buying much needed equipment for maintenance, and embraced on a major money saving project, the new solar system. Also, we have begun the work on the master landscape plan which includes improving our outdated irrigation sys-

Yes there is still a lot to be done and I must leave that to future boards. Before I close I must thank Patricia Orlando and Randy Newman for their continued devotion to Oceana, and also thank our staff. I also thank you for the excellent people you have elected. I have been so blessed to have such a dedicated board.


In closing I want to remind you to vote, but listen and think first.

1. I seek only the best for our community and it is time to standup for better management and stewardship of this great neighborhood!

2. I am concerned that our community is falling into a state of disrepair. I want to see a better

effort to improve the infrastructure of Oceana with better controls and decisions by the Board of Directors (BOD).

3. The Board of Directors seems to have fallen into a pattern of deficit spending. The Association has seen the Cash Reserve depleted by at least half in one year and yet the Board of Directors authorized pay increases.

4. Land lease fees have escalated dramatically in the past two years. At this rate our property values are declining as it is now common knowledge within the real estate industry. It will be difficult to sell our property at a fair price.

5. The accounting controls are not in place to ensure the integrity of the fees we pay to the Association.

6. I am committed to be a stronger Board of Directors that makes openness, fairness and accuracy in all its decisions their (BOD) primary purpose.

OCA's Solar Project




any questions have come up from owners concerning the board decision to install solar energy on our common area buildings. This decision has been under discussion for several years and we would like to "walk" through our decision process.

- This is a very large investment totaling \$392,000; however, it is anticipated to result in savings in utility bills of \$60,000 each year! We will save even more as electricity costs increase—enough to restore large sections of our neglected landscape or catch up on more of our deferred maintenance.
- There are 39 power meters in our community. The new system will be linked to nine of these meters. The power measured by each of these meters costs our community \$100 per month or more.
- Utility bills for the two swimming pools, spa, and clubhouse are the highest.
- This solar contract was approved unanimously last July in open session.

- It was also discussed in previous board meetings.
- Additionally, there was an open workshop available to all residents.
- Many of us are familiar with residential solar, but the scope of this job requires a commercial solar installer.
- We contacted multiple solar installers and brought in a highly respected solar consultant as part of our decision-making process.
- Power Purchase Agreements (PPA's) were not available for the size of our project and Lease Agreements would not yield the savings we were seeking.
- Loan interest costs would outstrip our reserve earnings.
- Federal Solar Tax Credits will also apply to our modest taxable income for 2020. We can "roll over" the remaining credits into future years for as long as the IRS solar tax credit is still in effect. The cumulative dollar-for-dollar tax savings may be substantial.

There have been at least 15 scenarios as how to make doing taxes safe for everyone. After approving a couple of ways that could possibility work, we workers approached the City of Oceanside for approval.

Due to *liability* and no where to do the taxes (El Corazon is completely closed and the Country Club is not open to the public) we were turned down.

As of this date there will be **no** AARP free taxes done in Oceanside.

If at a future date things improve and business and buildings open, we may be able to do taxes.

Once Again—To The Dogs!

Dogs are wonderful companions and friends. Many of us probably can't imagine living without them. And we have a lot of dogs in Oceana.

We created dogs and have developed them for a variety of roles. They have no place to exist except around us fulfilling those roles. And, if we choose to have a dog, we have the responsibility to properly train it and to manage its behavior.

A previous article in Notices and Reminders talked about dogs that bark continuously. The specific dog at issue is still barking, but not as much (or are the neighbors going deaf from the continuous racket?). Owners take note!

This article is about aggressive dogs, especially large aggressive dogs. Most dogs, large and small, are docile and friendly, especially if they have been properly trained and socialized as puppies.

But, there are exceptions. If your dog is large enough to break away from you when out walking and it has previously shown any signs of aggression, it may need a muzzle. Injuries to another dog can be a serious problem. Injuries to a human, especially a child, will be immensely worse.

> Remember: you are responsible for your dog's actions.

Recycle Your Batteries

If you have smaller-size batteries that you want to dispose of, **do not** put them into regular trash or into the recycle bin. Batteries contain hazardous materials that must receive special treatment.

Enclose old batteries in a plastic bag and put the bag on top of the lid of your recycle bin for regular trash collection. The trash collector will pick it up and handle it properly.



to get ready for a big growing season.

We are in the process of expanding our orchard in the back area, which has been raised to stop the flooding. Bruce Pahl has donated 3 avocado trees, Peggie Moore, a Mexican lime tree, and Christine Forster, an apple tree.

Club members have been reconfiguring a few garden enclosures thanks to Casey Fitzpatrick, Kevin Immel, and our new member, Peter Cornog. This will result in the addition of more garden plots. More work has been done to expand the succulent cactus garden over on the dog park side, and some special mix from Corazon was donated along with some rocks. It's going to be a spectacular little corner over there and also double as a nursery for plants.

The first test came when three storms in succession passed through at the end of January; there was no visible flooding.

Matava, including delivery.

Catalytic Converter Thefts

There has been a startling increase in catalytic converter thefts throughout San Diego County. In Oceanside, thefts often occur in neighborhoods near main thoroughfares, freeways, or at commercial establishments.

What is a Catalytic Converter?

A catalytic converter is a critical exhaust component of vehicles located underneath vehicles.

How/Why are Catalytic Converters stolen?

Suspects often remove catalytic converters with saws and snipping tools. The entire process can take just minutes. Catalytic Converters are sold for the precious metals they contain after being stolen.

Most frequently targeted vehicles

Vehicles in commercial establishments that are not in view of surveillance systems and Toyota Prius' are the most frequently targeted vehicles. Additional vehicles include: Lexus RX, Toyota Tacoma, Ford F150-550, Dodge 2500, Kia Sedona. But all vehicles, especially high profile vehicles, can be a target.

How to prevent the theft of your catalytic converter

- Park in a garage or well-lit area if a garage is not available.
- Park near building entrances or in high traffic areas
- Have your catalytic converter welded to your car.
- Calibrate your vehicle security system to detect vibration.
- Purchase cameras that clearly capture where you park.
- Purchase a security device for your catalytic converter.

"Cat Strap" and "Cat Clamp" devices both cost less than \$200.

Given the projected cost savings on electric utility bills, on the advice of consultants, and much consideration by the board, it was decided that spending the money to convert to solar made total fiscal sense. The expected payback period for this expenditure is five years or less.

As electricity costs continue to escalate, our decision to convert this portion of our community to solar will reap even more benefits. We will be able to spend our assessments dollars on visible, tangible projects rather than continuing to pay for the invisible soaring electric energy expenses, while benefitting our environment.
