A Message From a Member of our Board Of Directors

uring my term of serving on the board for the last two years, I have noticed an increasing amount of resistance by the residents and homeowners to observe the most basic policies, procedures, and rules.

I realized we live in a country that believes in free speech, but you made a choice to live within this HOA. Not all HOAs are the same. So saying you've lived in other HOAs really doesn't make any difference at all.

Unfortunately, we are paying additional insurance fees based on a claim that could have been prevented by the homeowner. Homeowners and residents that do not take care of their guests and do not supervise their guests while on the property of Oceana are putting everyone's pocketbook at risk.

Guests need to be supervised! This includes family members.

We also need to take responsibility for our own safety and security. Patrols aren't going to do it. Obviously, we are lucky enough to have OPD around the corner, but if we would just remember to close gates and doors to

the pool area and to the clubhouse our safety and security will go much further, as well as our liability expenses.

If you see something, say something. This includes the OPD non-emergency line, requesting a work order through Appfolio or calling the office. Do the right thing.

My last comment is very basic. If you are going to do something in the common area, please make sure to write up a request to the proper committee (Architectural or Landscape) and make sure that request goes to the full committee as well as the board of directors. This is how you get an approval. It's not hard folks. If you are denied. Then it's a denial. Do not proceed with your project. Making it "beautiful" in your opinion doesn't make the rules go away.

I urge everyone to vote, join a committee and observe the rules that you agreed to when you moved here.

It's just that simple.

An Update

Happy February!

The Friendship Garden has been transformed from a Cactus Garden to a California Native Plant Garden. We have planted around 30 varieties of California Native Plants and sown copious amounts of wildflower seeds. A rock garden is in the works and soon we will be working on the entry into the garden itself. We are thankful for the donations we have received (and spent) and are appreciative of the compliments we've heard when folks walk by and see the transformation going on. We are hopeful that by the end of February we will have wildflowers in bloom.

Please come visit!

The native plants don't look like they are doing much right now, but a lot is actually going on. They are adapting to being transplanted and going into a resting stage while they are developing roots and making connections with other plants. Some are beneficial to others if planted together. Rabbits are a natural part of the habitat and they have made their presence known. We've had to cage some areas and plants they like to dine on. A bluebird pair is on the fence most afternoons so we'll accommodate their beautiful presence with a house in the trees soon.

We hope the patch milkweed will be attracting Monarchs by the end of May. Milkweed will be started off-site and brought in as May approaches. of thel Many plants we have put in specifically attract butterflies.

The big tree near the garden was removed in October and the garden may be too hot for some plants and visitors come summer. 

<u>Did You</u> Know?

Brunklen

Benjamin Franklin

is one of the most ac-

complished members of our nation's founding fathers. He is known for many things including writer, scientist, inventor, statesman, diplomat, printer, publisher, and political philosopher. He participated in writing the Declaration of Independence and was a member of the Constitutional Convention that founded our present government. At the conclusion of that convention, as Franklin was leaving, a bystander asked him what form of government he had given the nation. Franklin's response was, "A republic, sir, if you can keep it."

This column is far from sufficient to talk about Benjamin Franklin. He is well known and has been written about profusely. But there is one episode in his life that may not be well

known.

For several years prior to the outbreak of the revolution, Franklin was in England representing several of the colonies. He had first attempted to convince the government to allow colonial representation in Parliament, and, when that failed, to allow the establishment of an independent Parliament in America with loyalty to the King. He had no success at either.

Following the Boston Tea Party and an entanglement in the disclosure of some official letters detrimental to the British-appointed Governor of Massachusetts, Franklin was summoned to appear before the Privy Council. At the Privy Council meeting (held in "the cockpit," so called because the room had originally been used by Henry VIII for cockfights), Franklin was subjected to a brutal hours-long tirade that one observer called "a torrent of virulent abuse" (a British understatement?).

Through it all, Franklin stood erect, without the smallest movement of any part of his body. His expression was of placid tranquility, and he did not allow a single change in it. At the end of the tirade, Franklin was called for "examination." He declined.

That was January of 1774. Franklin had worn a plain suit made of blue Manchester velvet. When he took that suit off, he packed it away but kept it with him. He never wore it again until . . .

In 1783, Franklin, as ambassador to France, was one of the negotiators at the peace talks with Britain, held in Paris. He unpacked that blue Manchester velvet suit and wore it to the negotiation meetings with the British.
