A Message From the Board Of Directors

n May, the Board made one of the most consequential decisions we will make all year - the decision to bring in a Community Management Company to manage the association. After months and months of interviews, research, and LOTS of meetings, we felt we had the information we needed to make a thoughtful and deliberate decision that will affect us all. As one of last year's key Strategic Plan issues and again on this year's plan, it felt good to decide. We appreciate all the input we had from so many of you to help us take this step forward.

Now we move to the hard part - the part to migrate to FirstService Residential, who we have chosen as our Community Management company. This summer we will have some bumps but stick with us. By the end of the year we should be feeling the results of this decision.

Which leads me to the next topic I wanted to highlight. "Oceana Lore" is an expression I use when referencing the rumors that sometimes swirl in our community. We have recently heard that homeowners are talking about and to our staff that they could lose their jobs when the community management company arrives.

Nothing could be further from the truth!

Part of the negotiations with First-Service includes the absorption of our team. If you hear someone referencing this, please make sure they have clear facts so that our employees feel secure in their employment.

While Dan and the team are transitioning to the new company, the Board will be focusing on our other strategic goals—resolving our current legal issues, physical risk, financial risk, and improving communication between the board, employees, and residents. Hopefully the information to follow here, the newly designed weekly e-Blasts, and the Fireside Chats each month (3rd Wednesday of each month in the Library at 6pm for one hour) are ways we are working to better communicate all what is happening here at Oceana.

Since 2016, the efforts by OCA Board of Directors to self-manage Oceana Community Association's 932 homes is fully appreciated, however, it is in the best interest of the entire community that we place you in the hands of professionals with years of HOA management experience, qualified to protect the community from risks and liabilities as well as financial strain. The transition begins in June and will be completed by August 1st.

Change can feel hard; but the office staff, at Dan's direction, will keep the community informed of the administrative changes that will affect each of you, primarily how payments of HOA fees are submitted. Here's their website

Resolve Current Legal Issues

As you know, Attorney Smelko of Procopio Law Firm was unable to attend the June 28, 2023, Board meeting. None-the-less, you have an opportunity to submit your questions to him and he will address them individually, trying to clarify some of your concerns on how we are moving forward to resolve the complexities of the Land Lease Reserve Replacement obligations of the Oceanside Land Company.

We have come much farther than it may seem thanks to the hard work of the previous 3 boards, and we ask that you trust the process underway to protect the future financial strength of Oceanside Association and property values for 932 homeowners. It is a daunting task, and your support for a positive resolve is appreciated. Currently fees for this legal process are budgeted out of 2023 Reserve Funds.

News You Can Use

Based on recent Board of Directors' decisions, homeowner comments and the May BoD General Session, here is news you can use:

Using Reserve Funds for Legal Action with OLC

The legal costs to pursue Oceanside Land Lease Company responsibility for replacement costs are allowed to be paid from Reserves per California Civil Code 5510:

(b) The board shall not expend funds designated as reserve funds for any purpose other than the repair, restoration, replacement, or maintenance of, or litigation involving the repair, restoration, replacement, or maintenance of, major components that the association is obligated to repair, restore, replace, or maintain and for which the reserve fund was established.

Parkways on Vista Campana

Update from City, the area between street and sidewalk (parkway) is not the City's responsibility to maintain. Sidewalk maintenance depends on what caused the damage. The City is responsible for maintaining the trees along the parkway. Dan and Fernando will prepare a proposal for what to do with parkways in June.

The Garden Club

After months of discussion about the Garden Club, they are officially back under the Activities Committee and can go forward doing what they do best. OCA residents will have a chance to check out what they do in August when there will be a great outdoor event at the Garden Club. Check them out!

Strategic Plan

The Board has been working on the 2023-2024 Strategic Plan since April. In June we discussed the steps being actively worked on: Community Management, Neighborhood Watch, Resource Information, Risk Management, and Budgeting.

Grant Submissions

The Board is working on a grant writing guidelines so that committees who want to pursue grants, where OCA might be eligible, have a clear path to what needs to be done and data they will need.

Red Fire Lines

It is **really important** that residents and their guests respect the red fire lines in our community. This is a safety hazard and we ask everyone to remember to **not** park in those red lined areas in all parts of the community. Management will be contacting the Oceanside Fire Department to ensure residents know how to report violations, etc.

Unit Painting

Several years ago OCA had a very thorough

painting project and the board at that time approved a paint pallet. So as units come up for painting, these paint pallet choices are available to the affected homeowners.

OCA Budget for 2024

We began the budget process in June for next year in order to have a solid plan by the fall. The first discussions on this will be at the July board meeting.

Consent Calendar on the Board Agenda

"What is that consent calendar on the agenda?", a homeowner asked recently. If there are areas of a meeting agenda, such as the committee reports, where there are no questions by the Board, a consent calendar motion can be made for those items vs. approving them one at a time.

The farmer loudly proclaimed, "God, I hate lard." Now the pastor was growing concerned.



 - 2. The Oceana landscape contractor may se-

lect plants for installation on slopes and in areas of Oceana, as approved by the Landscape Committee, at no cost for the plants.

3. For approved Adopt-a-Spot projects, sponsor(s) can select plants for free as long as

the plants are used in the spot.

4. The President of the garden Club or his/ her designee will meet with a homeowner interested in utilizing nursery plant material to determine which plants are available.

Community Resource Center

Being a Community Resource Center Greeter

The fun thing about being a CRC Greeter is the opportunity to meet new residents and help them if they need help to save on their budget or just have an interesting visit with a potential new friend!

My shift starts when I come in the Clubhouse door. I check the brochure racks to see if they are full and organized. I gain access to the Center by entering a code in the key box next to the door. When I open the doors, I open the blinds and keep the doors open to show I am ready for business. I turn on the two computers and a printer which are available for your use if you need to check your email or do a web search. If you use the printer it costs 20¢ for B&W or 40¢ for color and I have you drop the coins in a lock cash box on

the wall. (We don't have a key to open this, only office personnel handle the cash.) I note how many copies were made and cost on a form by the printer.

If you stop by to see what we do, I'll show you the different free programs available to our residents to save money on utilities, food, transportation, veterans programs and much more. You can take any of the brochure's home with you. You can also find this information on https://oceanaseniors.org/ under Committees CRC. If you need help filling out these forms, I have you fill out a Request for a Private Session Form which asks for your name and how to reach you to set up a private appointment at the Center or your home if you prefer. A Neighbor-to-Neighbor trained expert will be notified to call you to set up a confidential appointment and help you fill out the forms available for you. You can also stop in the office and fill out the request for service form and they will contact CRC for you.

Some days can be busy and some quiet. During the quiet times, as a Greeter, we have a file with a list of things that need to get done. It may be researching a new free service for our residents or filling the brochure racks. You will usually have time to check your own email or google search. When a resident comes into the Clubhouse, I like to give them a good morning greeting which sometimes might end up in them asking about what CRC is. Or, they might have a question about an activity or committee that I'm able to answer. Every day can be different.

So, if you have two hours a week, every other week or once a month to volunteer 10 AM to noon or 1 PM to 3 to help us, please contact CRC Chair, Teresa Chamberlain-Spradlin at OCACRC@gmail.com or stop in the office to fill out a volunteer form. Here are the times we need help: 1st Monday of the Month 10 AM to Noon; any Monday 1 to 3 PM; 2nd & 4th Tuesday 10 AM to Noon; any Tuesday 1 to 3 PM; any Thursday 10 AM to Noon and 1 to 3 PM; any Friday 1 to 3 PM.

CRC Veterans' Corner

Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Companion

The Medical Companion Program (MCP) provides transportation and supervised home re-

covery for veterans undergoing anesthesia or sedation related procedures who lack support of a caregiver. MCP simplifies healthcare access so more veterans can recover from procedures safely at home. MCP prevents unnecessary hospitalization. Veterans are able to recover and recuperate in their own home.

MCP facilitates a time limited, VA paid, medical companion services in which the companion accompanies the veteran during transport, throughout the veteran's procedure at the main VA Medical Center campus, and at the discharge location for a time period as clinically ordered.

Veterans Administration Medical Centers regulation mandates all veterans who undergo outpatient or ambulatory procedures using sedation and/or anesthesia are required to have a responsible adult accompany them to the procedure in order to facilitate their recovery and transition from a VA medical facility to their desired destination post care.

The Fairy Godmother spoke, "Congratulations Cinderella, Enjoy your new life!" And, with a blazing shock of bright light, she was gone.



National Ice Cream

According to the International Dairy Foods Association, the origins of ice cream date back to the second century B.C. when many prominent historical figures were recorded to have enjoyed consuming iced beverages mixed with snow. As the centuries passed, the snow and ice were refined into cream ice and in 1777, ice cream was first advertised in New York. However, ice cream was a rare delicacy for the elite until the 1800s when ice houses were built. With the advent of refrigeration and freezers, it has become a staple dessert for cultures around the world.

Facts & Quotes

- Per Guinness World Records, the tallest ice cream cone was made by Hennig-Olsen and Trond L Wøienin 2015. It was 10 ft. 1.26 in. tall.
- During the summer of 1790, President George Washington spent \$200 on ice cream. Meanwhile, according to Thomas Berry of Duke University, the price of 1 pound of coffee was \$0.50 in 1788.
- 10% of milk in the US goes toward making ice cream.
- During World War II, ice cream was served to troops to boost morale while sanctions and rationing was in effect for the general public. When the war ended, rationing of ice cream was lifted and Americans celebrated victory with a cold, creamy treat. In fact, each American consumed more than 20 quarts of ice cream in 1946.
- In 2014, 872 million gallons of ice cream were produced in the United States. The average American annually consumes 22 pounds of ice cream.

Things to Do

- Enjoy some ice cream.
- Get free or discounted ice cream. Most ice cream shops give away free ice cream or offer special discounts on this day.
- Make President Thomas Jefferson's favorite vanilla ice cream. It is archived at the Library of Congress.

Thomas Jefferson's Vanilla Ice Cream Ingredients:

- 2 bottles of good cream (size?)
- 6 yolks of eggs
- 1/2 lb. sugar
- 1 bean or stick of vanilla

Directions (per Thomas Jefferson):

Mix the yolks & sugar; put the cream on a fire in a casserole, first putting in a stick of Vanilla. When near boiling take it off & pour it gently into the mixture of eggs & sugar. Stir it well. Put it on the fire again stirring it thoroughly with a spoon to prevent it sticking to the casserole. When near boiling take it off and strain it thro' a towel. Put it in the Sabottiere then set it in ice an hour before it is to be served. Put into the ice a handful of salt.

Directions (Modern Interpretation):

- In a large heavy saucepan, combine cream and sugar. Split vanilla bean in half lengthwise. With a sharp knife, scrape seeds into pan; add bean. Heat cream mixture over medium heat until bubbles form around sides of pan, stirring to dissolve sugar.
- In a small bowl, whisk a small amount of the hot mixture into the egg yolks; return all to the pan, whisking constantly.
- Cook over low heat until mixture is just thick enough to coat a metal spoon and temperature reaches 160°, stirring constantly. Do not allow to boil. Immediately transfer to a bowl.
- Place bowl in a pan of ice water. Stir gently and occasionally for 2 minutes; discard vanilla bean. Press waxed paper onto surface of custard. Refrigerate several hours or overnight.
- Fill cylinder of ice cream freezer twothirds full; freeze according to the manufacturer's directions. (Refrigerate remaining mixture until ready to freeze.) Transfer ice cream to a freezer container; freeze for 4-6 hours or until firm. Repeat with remaining mixture.
