Director's Report:

Use of Common Ground

aren Bishop, Roxanne Remmel, and I have been working for several months on a plan to revise HOA thinking on the use of common ground by homeowners.

Compliance issues have forced your Board of Directors to deal with this issue. Neither the HOA nor the homeowners own the common ground on which our homes sit. It is leased from OLC (Oceanside Land Corp). As such, homeowners have been told for years that nothing can be built on or added to common ground by homeowners, except for AC units. Many homeowners, past and present, either knowingly or unknowingly, have gone ahead and altered the common ground around their homes without approval.

How do we bring these alterations into compliance and develop a plan for homeowner modification of common area going forward? Lets start with the principal of modification. A modification must be reasonable, not permanent in that it can be removed, must improve the value of the home and the community, and be approved by a committee, most likely the landscape committee representing the Board.


If approved, a homeowner making a modification will be required to sign a waiver of indemnification accepting responsibility for maintaining the modification as well as all liability due to the modification. Should the property be sold, a waiver will be offered to the new owner. Should the new owner decline, the homeowner who made the modification will be responsible for removing it and returning the area to its original state.

Homeowners with modifications they have done without HOA approval will be asked to go through the approval process or face possible fines.

Please recognize that we are trying to work out all the kinks in the process of bringing about this significant change. Patience is required by all to resolve this issue which has developed over many years!

News You Can Use

- We are recycling gravel from roof replacements. It is being used by the Garden Club to repair pathways, eliminating both the cost of hauling the gravel away to the dump and bringing new gavel in for use in the community. This pea gravel is piled outside the maintenance building.
- Pool rules keep us all safe. Reducing insurance liability to our HOA is a team effort.
 See something, say something!
- The newly formed Facilities Committee is looking for volunteers! It will consist of 3 to 7 members with a non-voting Board liaison. This committee will periodically review and physically inspect the HOA property to determine that it is in good order and repair as well as determine areas of deficiency and safety hazards. - Money from the Reserve Fund was approved at the July 19th General Session to begin the slope repair in Unit 2.
- The reduced private rental rate for the Clubhouse of \$150 was approved by the Board
- Soil injections of system fungicide for the Magnolia trees along Vista Bella was approved. The work will be done by Bright View.
- Brush cutting in the canyon adjacent to the Garden Club and Dog Park will proceed. The Board approved funds not to exceed \$4455.88 for the work.

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Monarch Butterflies

America's Monarchy



One of Ours!

eorge Washington refused to be appointed king because he believed that it was inappropriate and dishonorable. He fought the war for the sake of the American Republic not for his personal self aggrandizement. He was not motivated primarily by power and when a disgruntled military attempted to install a monarchy with him as king, he fiercely resisted.

We've had no Monarchs in America since, except for our beautiful Monarch butterflies. One of the most amazing natural phenomena in the world is their migration. These beautiful insects travel thousands of miles every year, from Canada and the United States to Mexico and Central America, where they spend the winter in a few mountain forests. They make this incredible journey without a map or a compass, guided by the sun and the Earth's magnetic field even though as individuals, they haven't traveled this route previously. Along the way, although they face many dangers, such as predators, storms, and habitat loss, most of them are able to survive and thrive and continue the life cycle.

But, how did they get the name "Monarch?" The name is believed to have been given in honor of King William III of England, as the butterfly's main color is that of the king's secondary title, Prince of Orange. Legend holds that Prince William of Orange (later King William III) was so adored by some early European settlers to North America that they bequeathed the name "Monarch" to our very orange and regal butterfly in his honor.

To paraphrase Willie Shakespeare, "a rose by any other name would smell just as sweet."


Prior to last September, when my butterfly Margaret embarked on her final and ultimate migration, we used to occasionally play a card game called "Kings in the Corner." While there

are no kings in the corner in Oceana, we do have Monarchs in the corner of the lovely friendship garden near the pool. It has an area which is designated a butterfly sanctuary and is maintained by Kathy Dowling and others. Recently with help of Jerry, her spouse, they were able to rescue newly hatched Monarchs from predators.

Comments From Kathleen:

"We rescued several Chrysalis'. The predators were ants, lizards and other small animals. Now the Chrysalis' have e-closed and the new monarch's are off to complete the cycle again. The cycle from egg to cattie (caterpillar) to chrysalis to monarch will repeat it self again and again at the Friendship Garden."





Once the Nominating Committee commences its work, Directors can only be involved in the election process if they run for another term and are active candidates.

Did You Know?



History

Constitution Day commemorates the adoption of the United States Constitution and celebrates the citizens of the United States. It was written because the first charter of government, the Articles of Confederation. had resulted in creating a weak and ineffective central government. The Constitution defines the supreme law of the United States, with each article pertaining to aspects such as the congress, president, judicial system, interrelationship between the state and federal government and process of amendments to the Constitution, James Madison, Oliver Ellsworth, Nathaniel Gorham, Alexander Hamilton, William Johnson, Rufus King, Gouverneur Morris, Benjamin Franklin and George Washington wrote the Constitution.

Constitution Day originally began in 1939 with the suggestion of a holiday to celebrate American Citizenship. President Harry Truman then declared that the third Sunday of May become 'I am American Day'. A decade later, 1953, President Dwight Eisenhower changed the date to coincide with the signing of the Constitution and renamed it Citizenship Day. Constitution or Citizenship Day is observed annually on September 17th, the same day as the US Constitution was signed in 1787.

Facts

- This year is the 236th anniversary of the U.S. Constitution. Our Constitution is the world's oldest—and the shortest.
- The Constitution has only 4,543 words before the amendments. In contrast, the Bible is about 20 times longer, while Harry Potter has about 70,000 more words.
- More than 11,000 amendments have been proposed in Congress. However, only 27 amendments received approval to become official amendments to the Constitution.
- The words God and Democracy are not found in the United States Constitution.
- The original of the U.S. Constitution is preserved today in the Rotunda of the National Archives Museum, along with the originals of the Declaration of Independence and the Bill of Rights. These three documents are known collectively as the Charters of Freedom.

Things to Do

- Read the U. S. Constitution.
- Watch documentaries relating to the Constitution including Constitution USA (2013), The Constitution Project (The Documentary Group, 2014), and The United States Constitution (2007).
- The next time you visit Washington D.C., be sure to visit the National Archives. The Museum General Entrance is at 701 Constitution Ave NW. It is well worth the effort.


