A Message From the Board Of Directors

y the time you read this, you will be deep into the holiday season - no matter what holiday you celebrate. It used to be my favorite time of the year, then 19 years ago I started producing a 1000-person, two-day New Year's Eve event in Arizona with my business partner, famed trumpeter Rick Braun (for you smooth jazz fans, you know who Rick is for sure!). Last year I decided I needed more space in my life, so it was my last New Years after an incredible and highly successful run. It feels so weird to be able to take a moment and enjoy my favorite holiday again.

I have an excellent surgeon (after two failed surgeries on the left foot I found the new guy!) and I am in good hands. Instead of my usual walking to meetings and the office, I will be chauffeured by my husband, a board member, or a neighbor and eventually a powered scooter on my own - watch out! But I will be in that boot and in the scooter the week before Christmas, attending a jazz Christmas show in downtown San Diego, and enjoying a real holiday - so yay!

This Past Year: The end of the year is always a time for reflection. I am eternally thankful for Peter, Karen, Lynn, Evelyn, Roxanne, and Kelly who brighten my days by

being an incredibly thoughtful and smart board of directors. They always think of what is best for our community, even when it is really hard. This past year has called for lots of hard decisions, but I believe the decisions we made point us in the right direction. I am thankful for the FirstService Residential management staff who support all that we do at OCA, especially Dan Farrar who serves as our GM and with whom I have daily interactions. News You Can Use

Annual Report

By now or any day now you should have received the annual report by mail to all homeowners. This report is full of very important information and you should make sure to thoroughly review it as soon as it is received. The new rental form (see below) must be turned back into the office by year end and one must be on file for every home in OCA.

Minutes from Board Meetings

The board voted, in compliance with the law, that the draft minutes of board meetings are available to Members within 30 days with a request to the office. The final minutes will be posted on the FirstService Connect platform and can also be requested from the office. A Director will continue to prepare the News You Can Use part of the Highlights to include a summary of our board actions. Draft minutes will no longer be included in the Highlights. Members have to obtain, if desired.

Temperature Control

As requested in homeowners' comments in September, the thermostats in meeting rooms will now be available for homeowners to adjust during open hours in the complex. The thermostats will go back to the controlled cycle during the closed hours. **Please** remember to set the temperature back to where you found it when you leave a room, turn off ceiling fans/lights, and close all windows. We will be monitoring this to make sure we are not increasing our SDG&E costs and hopeful that homeowners will use the new process wisely.

2022 Year End Review

The board accepted the 2022 Year End Review as accurate, and you will receive a copy in the Annual Report packet mailed to every homeowner.

Kelly Byrne (Re)Joins the Board

Immediate past president, Kelly Byrne, was voted in at the October meeting to fill our board vacancy for the remainder of the term (until March 16). Welcome back, Kelly!

2024 Proposed Budget

After numerous meetings by the Budget Committee, Finance Committee, and Community Town Halls, a final budget was approved. This was a very difficult cycle due to the demands of our aging infrastructure, increased costs (for example, Waste Management, after negotiations, is going up between 20 and 40 percent next year due to new laws), and of course,

our continued requirement to pay the land lease. The actual amount needed was an increase of \$109 a month, but the Budget and Finance Committees were able to trim 40% of that down. While this has some risk, we heard the homeowners loud and clear at the town halls. The monthly assessment, starting January 1,2024 is \$604.25. A difference may occur when the final cost of insurance is known. Our insurance policy is up for renewal February 1, 2024.

Please Note: the weekly eBlast now contains a Line Item of the Week that explains the larger items and why they are budgeted the way they are. We hope you are finding this useful.

2024 Special Assessment

A one-time special assessment of \$360 per home was approved to cover the 2024 costs of litigation in the OCA vs. OLC (Oceanside Land Company) action. This will be assessed on your January statement unless you made other arrangements with the office by the end of November. We communicated the available payment plans by email multiple times and by mail with the annual report.

We have released a set of notes by now from the October 11 meeting with our general counsel and our legal counsel for the OCA vs. OLC litigation. A cover page was developed to show homeowners what impact the land lease has on us as an association and you as a homeowner. This is the reason we continue down the path of litigation with OLC. Rest assured that the board meets every time something happens with the litigation to reconfirm our commitment to this process. To date, we are unanimous in moving forward.

Landscape Contractor Selection Ad Hoc Committee

The Board formed this committee in September and they have already sent out the board approved RFPs. The committee will begin interviews in late November/early December, before making a recommendation to the Board in December. The Ad Hoc is made up of two board members, two members of the landscaping committee, management, and two community members at large. The new landscape year will begin March 1, 2024.

CC&R and Bylaw Review Ad Hoc Committee

The Board formed this committee in October to look at the CC&Rs and Bylaws to determine what amendments, if any, should be submitted to the Members on the March 2024 ballot. The committee is comprised of Directors Karen Bishop and Kelly Byrne. We reached


Week 1: Bingo: We had a great crowd for our morning Bingo session in October. Ellen Marciel again called the games. After several regular

John and Brian were back again at Oceana to perform and sing for our residents. John has







Ad Hoc IT Committee

Oceanside Digital Equity Plan

Congratulations to the City of Oceanside for creating and implementing the Oceanside Digital Equity Study. Oceanside aims to advance three pillars of digital equity, including access to reliable Internet, access to digital devices and digital literacy skills training.

The city has created the project: Oceanside FiberCity. The \$200 million investment is funded through The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021. High speed, fiber optic network will be installed on every public street by SiFi Networks LLC, which can provide the infrastructure into all businesses and homes at no charge. The company will install and maintain the system. SiFi Networks has contracted with its first provider, T-Mobile Fiber. When you check the availability, Oceanside is one of eleven locations nationwide.

A low-income component will make highspeed access more accessible to all, including seniors. The new T-Mobile Fiber program is advertising gigabit speeds, great streaming on multiple connections, no cap on data and no contracts.

The Ad Hoc IT Committee is researching the possibilities for Oceana. The COX contract will be up for renewal in 2025. With fiber, competition could make a difference in services and pricing. Through a bulk contract between OCA and SiFi Networks LLC, 932 homes install a fiber network connection at no cost. For those who are not interested, the connection would by capped until the homeowner is ready.

The committee invites you to learn more by searching the Oceanside Digital Access Study, Oceanside FiberCity, SiFi Networks Oceanside and T-Mobile Fiber.



Internet Safety

The Veterans' Information Fair held at Oceana's clubhouse in November included two FBI agents, who provided very useful information about dealing with scammers. The agents were there to warn veterans about internet fraud including the growing risk of scammers tricking you into revealing your email, your passwords, your address, your phone number or even your bank account info. Until I spoke with these agents, I had no idea that U.S. government law enforcement agencies have task forces working on this critical issue full time.

The agents encouraged all of us to report any internet or home phone fraud/scam attempts to the "Internet Crime Complaint Center" at https://www.ic3.gov. Although the FBI is rarely able to take any immediate action if you have been scammed, they would like you to report any emails or phone calls you believe are potential or real scams. The more reports they get, the faster they can track down the scammers and stop them.

One way to verify that an email is actually from someone you know is to move your cursor over the name of the sender. A tiny upsidedown 'v' will appear to the right of the sender's apparent name. Click on the v and the real email address of the sender will appear. It's usually quite obvious when it's not a valid email.

The agents told us that every piece of information they receive helps them narrow down the location of the scammers (many of whom are in other countries). Sharing information with other international organizations, helps them catch and stop these criminals. It's a huge undertaking but they can't do it without citizen participation. Below are more detailed instructions from the FBI about the type of information they would like you to submit to them if you have been the victim of a scam or an attempted scam.

Log into: https://www.ic3.gov and follow the instructions for reporting a scam.

The FBI requests that you hold onto the following information/documents which can help them identify the scammers.

- Original records: emails, letters, checks, receipts, shipping documents
- Financial transaction information used by the scammers
- Other information used by the scammers such as bank accounts, addresses, emails, websites, and phone numbers.

The most effective things you can do to keep your assets safe from scammers are:

- Do not open any emails from senders you do not recognize.
- If an email looks suspicious, be sure to click on the tiny upside-down 'v' which appears to the right of the sender's apparent name. Clicking on the 'v' will reveal the real email of the sender.
- DO NOT click on any links in an email unless you are 100% certain that it is from someone you know. If you have any doubts about its authenticity, contact the sender (friend, family member or other sender), to make sure they really sent it. (If they were hacked, scammers can use their email to fool you and get access to your personnel info).
- When you receive emails from banks or other financial institutions asking you to click on a link in the email—don't. Go instead to the actual website of the organization and log on with your ID and password.
- In addition to providing the requested information to the FBI, immediately contact your financial institution and credit bureaus if you believe you have been hacked.
- Another way to protect your credit if you are not planning to borrow money in the near future is to have your credit frozen through one of the credit bureaus. (You can always unfreeze it if you need to apply for a loan.)
- Phone scams: Never answer the phone if you don't recognize the caller. Let the call go to voice mail then listen to the message. No legitimate organization (private or government) will call you asking for personal information or for money. Never give out any personal or financial information to someone who calls you or sends you an email. If you find it all too confusing ask a neighbor or a family member to help you. Stay safe, everybody!

History

The Beginning of Winter, also

known as the Winter Solstice, marks the astronomical start of winter. It occurs when the tilt of the Earth's axis is farthest away from the sun, resulting in the shortest day and longest night of the year. In the northern hemisphere, it is in December & in the southern hemisphere, it occurs in June.

The solstice has been celebrated for millennia across the globe, serving as a significant event in various religious and cultural traditions. Many cultures held various ceremonies throughout the centuries to mark and honor the solstice, which they viewed as a time of rebirth and renewal, signifying the return of longer daylight hours. Today, many Americans may not be aware of the traditional significance of the Winter Solstice, but its influence can still be felt through popular holiday customs, such as Christmas and Hanukkah, whose origins date back to pre-Christian and pre-Jewish Solstice celebrations.

Today, many acknowledge and observe the solstice through a variety of private celebrations and communal gatherings. People light candles, attend bonfire ceremonies, or host feasts with friends and family to mark the return of the light and the promise of spring.

Facts

- On the Winter Solstice, there are 24 hours of sunlight in the Antarctic Circle, and 24 hours of darkness in the Arctic Circle.
- Many pagan rituals have revolved around the Winter Solstice. The short days and long hours of darkness prompted rituals intended to lure the Sun back.
- There is a tradition in the northern part of China to eat "Lidong water" or "winter water", which is water stored overnight. Drinking it is believed to protect from the cold and diseases.
- The Mayan calendar ended on the Winter Solstice, December 21, 2012.

- Light some candles and enjoy the early evening
- Finish some last minute Christmas shopping.
