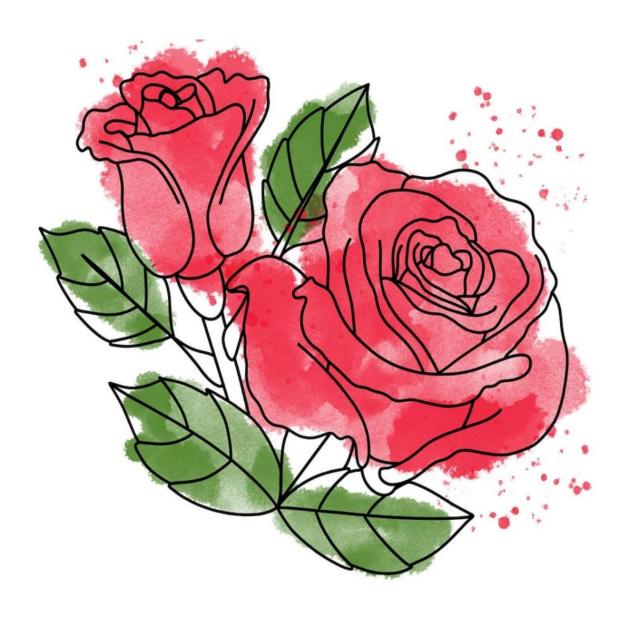

A Message from the Board

OW!! Is it just that Spring is in the air, or has everything come alive? People are walking their dogs, and greeting me as I pass. Birds are singing and I smell the sweet fragrance of flowers. Oceana is a

great place to live!!

I want to highlight Total Landscape Creations and our own Landscape Committee. Besides the hard task of deciding on homeowner's requests for the common areas, they have gone a step beyond to beautify our community. Mike McLaughlin and the volunteers in LSC have been receiving free trees from SDGE in lots of 20 trees. Together with Bob Bhanyon from Total Landscape, who does the planting, they are enriching our senses and providing habitat for the birds. A total of 50 trees have been planted in various areas around Oceana and another 20 will arrive next month and possibly more in the

Mike has also been in contact with the City of Oceanside over the past year and it has paid off. The City has agreed to plant 20 trees along Vista Campana as early as this Fall, covering the cost of the trees as well as the planting. Our task is to water and help them to thrive and then another 20 trees will arrive next year, with up to 100 trees total.

Another project they are working on in partnership is a plan to convert our antiquated sprinkler timers (or 'clocks' to the industry) to more sophisticated ones. They are looking at City rebates. Taking advantage of free money should help us save on our water bills by having more efficiently timed sprinklers. Another project in the early stages is to convert our pipes to use non-potable water for irrigation. The State of California mandated that by 2029 potable water can no longer be used to irrigate ornamental landscaping in HOAs. Maybe you don't realize this, but almost all our irrigation is tied to our fresh potable water. Mike, Bob, and the Landscape Committee are fervently working with the Golf Course who are in the midst of converting their irrigation to non-potable water, referred to as 'purple pipe'. We are hoping to piggyback on their conversion for our adjacent units. We will report more as this project moves along and the costs come

On another note, our litigation got a strong boost when the judge ruled against the opposition's (OLC) demurrer to strike down our case against the Land lease Company (OLC). On cause of action 1-4 the judge agreed that our current case against OLC is different than the case in 1984, therefore it doesn't fall under the statute of limitations and we can proceed. We are asking and expecting OLC, the Lease Company that we pay thousands of dollars to monthly, to be responsible for replacements of the aging common area infrastructure. The judge also gave us leave to amend the 5th cause of action for declaratory relief. We will have more on this as it unfolds. I am committed to helping you understand a very complex case. Feel free to reach out to me if you have questions. Thank you for your continued support, it will make a huge difference in how we control our costs as our common areas continue to age.

The Board of Directors is in the midst of formulating our Strategic Plan for 2024-25. Do you have ideas? We'd love to hear from you. You can email your ideas to me at; rremmel@ocaoffice.org. Or come to our 'OCA 1st Town Hall' on June 8th, 2024 1-3pm. It will be a fun open discussion and member participation, with lots of updates on our budget, litigation, IT, strategic plan,

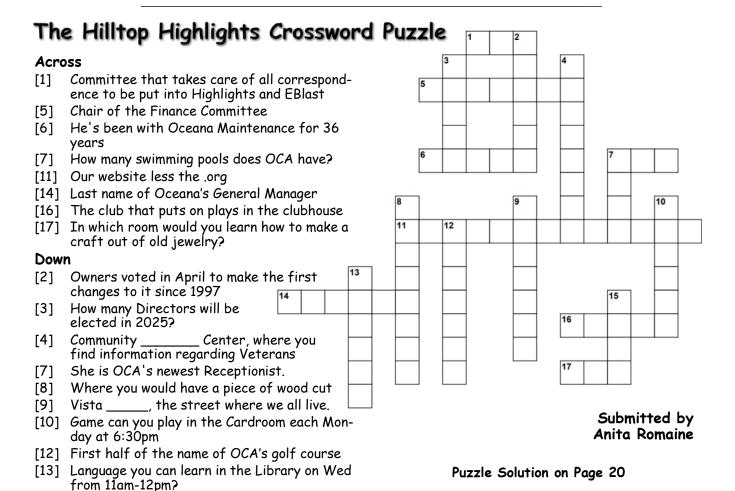
I take this opportunity to thank all the volunteers who assisted in donating their time and efforts to make this an unforgettable event.

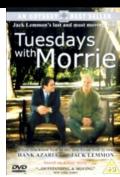

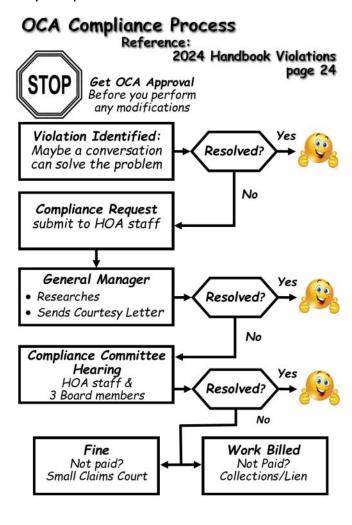

Air Travel Tip

In my planning for a trip, I found this valuable resource to assist any passenger requesting support through the TSA process. You don't need to be TSA pre-check or have a visible disability. No written documentation is needed. Happy traveling!

TSA Cares and PSS

We strive to provide the highest level of security while ensuring all passengers are treated with dignity and respect. To that end, we launched TSA Cares and the Passenger

Support Specialist (PSS) program.

TSA Cares is a dedicated helpline that provides information on screening procedures pertaining to those with disabilities, medical conditions, and other circumstances. We also coordinate assistance through checkpoint screening via the PSS program. PSSs are TSA Officers who have received advanced training on helping passengers with disability, medical, or other circumstances through the screening checkpoint. A PSS can provide assistance from the beginning of the security checkpoint where you show your boarding pass and identification until you have completed the screening process and leave the checkpoint.

The level of service will vary based on the airport's resources. Some airports may have the resources to call or email you ahead of time to coordinate a meeting point and others may simply notify the checkpoint of your estimated arrival based on your departure time.

You may always request to speak with a PSS or a supervisor when you arrive at the checkpoint.

If you believe you would benefit from this service, please call TSA Cares at least 72-hours in advance of travel. We will collect your travel dates, flight information, and the type of assistance needed, and forward the information to the airport. If you are unable to provide 72-hour notice, you may request to speak with a PSS or supervisor for assistance at the checkpoint.

You may contact TSA Cares at (855) 787-2227 between 8 a.m. and 11 p.m. (ET) Monday through Friday, or between 9 a.m. and 8 p.m. (ET) on weekends and holidays. You may also use the TSA Cares form provided online at www.tsa.gov/contact-center/form/cares.

If you need in-flight assistance, wheelchair assistance from the curb to the flight or other assistance outside of the screening checkpoint, please contact your airline before traveling. Airlines will generally work with you to try to meet your particular needs. TSA does not provide or coordinate wheelchair assistance.

Garden Club

Basil

Our Plant of the month (Ocimum Basilicum)

This delicious culinary herb is used in cuisines worldwide. Also called great basil, it is from of the mint family. There are many varieties of basil. In Western cuisine, the generic term "basil" refers to the variety known as sweet basil or Genovese basil. This plant is native to tropical regions from Central Africa to Southeast Asia. In temperate climates basil is treated as an annual plant, however, basil can be grown as a short-lived perennial or biennial in warmer horticultural zones with tropical or Mediterranean climates.

Gardener Jayne's delicious pesto sold out last year at our Summer Event. Many of the Garden Club members are planting extra basil for this year's Garden Gala Event on June 29th. Make sure you arrive early to get your fresh baked bread and pesto topping.

Recipe for Caprese Salad

- Set 2 (8-ounce) balls of mozzarella on clean kitchen or paper towels for about 15 minutes, then slice to ¹/₄-inch thick.
- After removing the stems, slice 2-3 medium to large ripe tomatoes crosswise to about 3/8-inch thick.
- Arrange the tomatoes and mozzarella on a serving platter. Alternate between the two.
- Add the basil. Tuck whole deep emerald green leaves between the slices, making sure most of the leaves are visible to add bright flashes of green.
- Season with high-quality extra virgin olive oil and pepper. Add enough oil so that the flavor is evident, about 3 to 4 tablespoons. I like to use garlic-flavored olive oil. Grind just a touch of black pepper over the top and let the salad rest for 5-10 minutes.
- Add a pinch of Himalayan salt on top of the salad as a final touch. Serve right away. *

Red-Tailed Hawk

The California red-tailed hawk is a common visitor in and around our garden plots, mainly seen early in the mornings and in the late evenings. These beautiful and striking birds have a wingspan of around 4 feet, can weigh between 1.5-3.5 lbs. and live for around 15 years. Their diet consists of small rodents including

mice, rats, and squirrels as well as reptiles, such as lizards and snakes. The female red -tailed hawk is around 25 percent bigger than the male. Their eyesight is about 8 times more powerful than human eyesight.

These magnificent birds are very friendly;

they fly above you and around you, perching on the nearby trees and garden plot fences. These powerful, majestic birds represent

strength, courage and wisdom and are a beautiful asset to our garden plots.

The Kainga Steel Drums music group started our summer "Poolside" Concert Series. It was fun and uplifting music from this North San



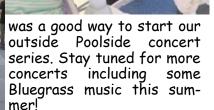
Diego group. A good turnout of folks came to

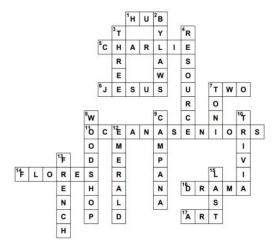
General News
