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

A Message from the Board of Directors

o you believe it is already December? 2024 is ending, and the New Year will soon start. It also looks as though the seven-person Board you have come to know may be coming to an end. One of our Board of Directors will probably live in another state when this Hilltop High-

lights is at your door. I thought it would be a good time to review the Davis Stirling rules for filling a Board of Director vacancy.

"It is not uncommon for a director to vacate his/her seat prior to the end of their term. A heavy workload at the office, family issues, health problems, or they sell their unit and cease to be qualified to serve on the board make it difficult to remain on the board. If there is more than one vacancy such that the remaining directors are less than a quorum, the board cannot conduct any business except to appoint other directors to the board until they have enough to make quorum. (Corp. Code § 7224(a).)

Unless otherwise provided in the articles or bylaws and except for a vacancy created by the removal of a director, vacancies on the board may be filled by approval of a majority of the remaining directors on the board. (Corp. Code § 7224(a).) This general principle is also described in Robert's Rules of Order: "The power to appoint or elect persons to any office or board carries with it the power to accept their resignations, and also the power to fill any vacancy occurring in it, unless the bylaws expressly provide otherwise." RONR (12th ed.) 47:57. If the vacancy occurs close to an annual meeting, the board might decide to leave the seat empty and let the membership fill it."

Fireside Chat

Notes from 10/16/24

The October Fireside Chat was held October 16, 2024 in the Clubhouse Library. Of the six residents who attended, four were relatively new to the community. All names are changed here to protect privacy.

John, a long-time resident, expressed concerns about mosquitoes. He asked how he could get his neighbors to comply with county



recommendations to keep all outdoor containers (such as plant saucers) free of water to avoid mosquito breeding. The residents present discussed options. His concern is a reminder for us all to check outdoor containers for water. The irrigation is currently on 3 nights a week, so plant saucers will of-

ten have water in them. Thanks to John, I turn my plant saucers upside down when I see they have water in them. Inside my house/patio, I check for standing water in pet bowls, a fountain, my plant saucers and bird baths. The San Diego County website tells us mosquitos can breed in as little as $\frac{1}{4}$ " of water. The website also has a form where you can report high mosquito activity, green pools, and dead birds.

Two newer residents, Bo and Marie, reported they have seen dead rats in the streets now and then and are concerned about possible poisoning and poison moving up the food chain to our raptors. Neighbors shared with Bo and Marie what they know about the topic. The discussion was a reminder that our rules and regulations say do not leave poison (D-con and others) out as rat bait. Rodenticides prevent blood clotting and the poison is lethal to anything that eats it. If you have rats around your home send a work order to the office through the Keystone Pacific portal to have our pest control company come and put one of their safer box traps out. If you see a dead rat in the landscape and don't feel comfortable picking it up with a plastic bag, please call the office right away to have it picked up. Dogs and other critters are attracted to dead rats. This time of year rats are searching for places to nest, so have a look around your place. Thanks for the reminder about a common problem in any neighborhood, Bo and Marie.

Two other residents came to the Fireside Chat to ask questions and gave pertinent advice about working with new management companies. They asked when and where the agendas for both the Board Executive Session and General Session are posted. The agendas are posted in the box outside the office and the box outside the Clubhouse at least three days prior to each meeting. Their suggestion was to put the agendas in the Friday E-blast prior to the meetings. One of them stated that posting the board agenda in multiple places leads to increased transparency. Thanks for your idea, neighbors.

It felt good to know these homeowners are concerned about the well-being of the entire community. Happy Holidays everyone!

503 Vista Bella Ad Hoc Committee

On Monday, October 28th, 2024, the Oceanside Planning Commission held a public hearing for the proposed apartment tower at 503 Vista Bella. The planning staff spoke first, and reiterated that state law allows developers, who are proposing low-income units, to ask for an unlimited number of waivers. Individual cities cannot deny them unless it can be shown that health or safety impacts will ensue.

Next, the developer's lawyer and architect spoke, after which the group presentation on behalf of Oceana was heard. Five health/safety issues were pointed out, as follows: ingress/egress problems, emergency vehicle safety, pedestrian safety, slope instability and negative health impacts of the new tower. None were enough for the Planning Commission to deny the application. Anticipating the Planning Commission's approval of the application, we requested five mitigation measures for each of the 5 health/safety impacts:

1) Create an evacuation plan to offset the increased traffic at our ingress/egress points.

2) Make the apartment tower age restricted to reduce parking and traffic associated with a "faster pace of life."

3) Install flashing pedestrian beacons at the corner of Vista Campana and Vista Bella

4) Provide civil engineering drawings for the site


5) Establish a \$200,000 trust fund to correct any ventilation problems that result from the new tower.

Pastor Jonathan of the Coastline Baptist Church also spoke to the Planning Commission in opposition to the project. An appeal has been filed on behalf of Oceana, and will be heard by the City Council. The developers cannot file for building permits until the appeal is heard. Please watch your Friday eBlasts for more information regarding the appeal, including the date of the Oceanside City Council meeting. There will be carpooling opportunities to ride with someone who is comfortable driving at night. The eBlasts are your fastest and most accurate link to information. 


The birds will survive, even better without a horde of rats around.



Did You Know? (from Medievalists.net)



Some of our most popular phrases have a long history, including some that go back to the Middle Ages. Here are 10 medieval phrases from the Dictionary of Idioms and their Origins.

(English spellings used throughout.)

1. "The apple of one's eye"

In early medieval England, the pupil of the eye was known as the apple (Old English æppel) since it was thought to be an apple-shaped solid. Since the delicate pupil of the eye is essential for vision, it is a part that is cherished and to be protected. Thus apple of the eye was used as a figure for a much-loved person or thing. Even King Alfred the Great (died 899) used this phrase.

2. "Baker's dozen"

This phrase arose from a piece of medieval legislation, the Assize of Bread and Ale of 1262. Bakers of the period had a reputation for selling underweight loaves, so legislation was put in place to make standardized weights. To make sure that they did not sell underweight bread, bakers started to give an extra piece of bread away with every loaf, and a thirteenth loaf with every dozen.

3. "To curry favour"

The phrase came from the Middle English words 'curry favel', which in Old French was 'estriller fauvel'. It meant 'to rub down or groom a chestnut horse. In Le Roman de Favuel, a 14th-century French romance, a chestnut horse representing hypocrisy and deceit is carefully combed down by other characters in order to win his favour and assistance. The popularity of the work led people to accuse those who tried to further their own ends by flattery to be currying favel. By the sixteenth century the phrase had changed slightly to currying favour.

4. "To play devil's advocate"

Devil's advocate is a translation of the Latin 'advocatus diaboli'. This was the popular title given to the official appointed by the Roman Catholic church to argue against the proposed canonization of a saint by bringing up all that was unfavourable to the claim. The post, which was officially known as Promoter of the Faith (promotor fidei), seems to have been established by Pope Leo X in the early sixteenth century.

5. "To throw down the gauntlet"

The gauntlet was a piece of armour that knights wore to protect their forearms and hands. A gauntlet-wearing knight would challenge a fellow knight or enemy to a duel by throwing one of his gauntlets on the ground.

6. "By hook or by crook"

Records of this phase date back to the 14th century. One theory for its origin suggests that a medieval law about collecting firewood allowed peasants to take what they could only cut from dead trees by using their reaper's bill-hook or a shepherd's crook.

7. "Hue and cry"

This phrase dates back to 12th-century England. Hue comes from the Old French 'huer', which means to shout out. In the Middle Ages, if you saw a crime being committed, you were obliged to raise 'hue' and 'cry', that is to shout and make noise, to warn the rest of the community, so they could come to pursue and capture the criminal.

8. "A nest egg"



By the fourteenth century the phrase nest egg was used by peasants to explain why they left one egg in the nest when collecting them from hens - it would encourage the chickens to continue laying eggs in the

same nest. By the seventeenth century this phrase now meant to set aside a sum of money for the future.

9. "A red-letter day"

During the fifteenth century it became customary to mark all feast days and saints' days in red on the ecclesiastical calendar, while other days were in black.

10. "To sink or swim"

The phrase refers to the water ordeal, a medieval practice of judging whether a person was innocent or guilty by casting him or her into a lake. The belief was that water would not accept anyone who had rejected the water of baptism, so if the victim sunk they were innocent, but if they floated they were guilty. Chaucer used a similar phrase: "Ye rekke not whether I flete (float) or sink".
