The candidates are presented in alphabetical sequence.







Fireside Chats (3rd Wednesday of every month, 6-7 pm in the Library)



The December 11th chat was hosted by Board Member of the Month, President Roxanne Remmel. A small group of residents showed up for a lively discussion.

Due to the Fireside Chats discussions,

- The Board and Von are working with Keystone to get the recorded General Meetings on the Keystone Homeowner Portal. We will let you know when they are available and where to find them.
- 2. Management is working on improved responsiveness between staff, vendors, and homeowners.
- 3. A work request was submitted after it was pointed out that the rain gutter near the Jacuzzi was rusted and needed repair.

OLC Litigation

Our attorneys are actively pursuing a settlement through negotiations and possible mediation with OLC. As soon as we are able, we will provide you with the specifics.

Election Coordination Committee (ECC)

The ECC has been hard at work and has announced the candidates for the 2025 Board of Directors elections. They are, in alphabetical order: Steve Gillis (Unit 7), Stephen Graves (Unit 8), Ned Lachman (Unit 1), Peggie Moore (Unit 11), and Brian Young (Unit 12).

There will be three opportunities to hear from the candidates in person:

- Saturday, 2/15 1:00 PM, Candidate Forum #1
- Wednesday, 2/19 1:00 PM, Candidate Forum #2
- Friday, 2/21 1:00 PM, an informal "Meet the Candidates" event where residents interact directly with the candidates.

This month you will receive your ballot for candidates as well as a referendum vote to approve some additional language to our Bylaws to allow for future electronic voting. This Bylaw change will allow OCA to take advantage of the recent CA Law AB2159 that now allows electronic voting as well as the traditional pa-

per ballots. Community members will still be able to opt for a traditional written ballot. In addition, paper ballots are required for Special Assessment votes.

Benefits of Electronic Voting include: increased participation, efficiency & accessibility, enhanced security, and cost savings.

PLEASE help us reach our quorums by voting for the candidates and the referendum.

Some of you have requested better security in the pool area. Management is in the process of getting final bids for cameras at our pool area and office. This should be installed in early 2025.

Did You Know?



History

Valentine's Day is a celebration of love and friendship. The idea of Valentine's Day seems to have originated during the Middle Ages, somewhere around the 14th or 15th century. The holiday derived its name from two Roman martyrs for love, both named Valentine.

The first Valentine was beheaded on February 14th, but not before leaving a note signed 'from your Valentine for his lady.' The second Valentine was supposedly a bishop who secretly married young couples, an act that was forbidden by the Roman Emperor who wanted young men to first serve as soldiers before marrying. Valentine ignored the law and was beheaded on February 14. An ancient Roman festival called Lupercalia, a celebration for which young men randomly chose the name of a young girl to escort to the festivities, has also been linked to the origins of Valentine's Day. Since then, the custom of selecting a sweetheart on February 14th has spread through Europe and its colonies and transformed itself into the celebration of love and friendship that we know today.

Facts about Valentine's Day

- Symbols for Valentine's day include hearts, chocolate, flowers, and Cupid - the Roman God of Love.
- Love looks not with the eyes but with the mind. And therefore is winged Cupid painted blind - William Shakespeare, A Midsummer Night's Dream
- 52% of US consumers will send out at least one Valentine's Day card, 47% will send candy, and 34% will send flowers.
- According to Marketing Charts, in 2023, Valentine's Day consumer spending in the US surpassed \$24 billion.
- According to the National Retail Federation, in 2022, Valentine's Day spending in the US reached \$23.9 billion. The median amount spent by a US consumer for this holiday was \$192.

Meet Your Neighbor

estled in the heart of Oceana, this month I am delighted to introduce to you, Pam Spangler, living here with her husband Neal, since 2020.



Pam was born an only child in 1953, in San Diego, California, where she was raised by her father, as her mother passed away when she was 5 years old. Pam grew up in Mission Beach and then in Clairemont where she attended Clairemont High School. While in her senior year, through a career counselor, she met Dr. Norman "Skip" Sperber, a dentist just out of the Navy. Skip became her mentor, her boss and her best friend until he died last year. He trained her in all aspects of the dental field and because he was a Forensic Odontologist, she and Skip also worked at the San Diego Coroner's Office together. There, they identified deceased individuals who were beyond recognition, using dental records and x-rays. Sometimes Skip would be called to evaluate bite mark evidence in homicide, rape and child abuse cases necessitating they take dental impressions of suspects in custody. Pam remembers vividly, when PSA flight 182 collided with a Cessna over a residential neighborhood in North Park, in 1978. Skip closed his dental office and they worked at the Coroner's office day and night for the next week, identifying 144 persons who perished in the crash.

In 1990, Pam left San Diego and moved to Las Vegas, Nevada where she met and married her husband, Neal. It was there she gave birth

to a daughter, Jean Faye, who she named after her mom. Continuing her dental career, Pam adjudicated dental insurance claims for State of Nevada employees, culinary and bartender unions and Steve Wynn's hotels. Missing the interaction with patients, Pam returned to the dental office to manage the practices of a general dentist and a periodontal surgeon. In 2018, after her daughter and family moved to Oregon, Pam and Neal retired, left the desert, and moved to Tennessee. There, they lived in a secluded area surrounded by beautiful woods and lots of wild life! It was then that Pam shared, "I never stopped missing the ocean and San Diego's weather, so after 30 years of being 'homesick', I finally made my way back home."

Naturally, my question was, "Why Oceana?" Pam responded immediately with, "the proximity to the beach" and "it was 55+ and affordable." For Pam, being part of Oceana is about more than just living here. It's also about having the opportunity to give back. She volunteers at Share & Wear and also on the HUB Committee, where she does editing for our Hilltop Highlights. When not engaged in volunteering, Pam enjoys riding her bike at the beach, walking the grounds at Oceana, chair yoga, and cooking. The next time you see Pam, don't hesitate to stop and say hello. You might just make a new friend!





Veterans' Corner

It's been a few hours since the news broke about the death of President Jimmy Carter. My first thought was this world lost an American icon. He was the 39th President of the United States. That was his second career. Prior to serving as the 39th Commander in Chief, President Carter was a Naval Submarine

Officer. He began his legacy by serving in the military. President Carter took the oath and signed a blank check to the American people. The people thanked him with the honor of electing him to run the most powerful office in our nation. In his post presidency, President Carter was admired for his humanitarian work. "My faith is that I do whatever I can, wherever I can, whenever I can, for as long as I can with whatever I have to try to make a difference". That he did. Then I questioned, will President Carter have a traditional dignitary funeral service? Will the service include the 21-Armed Salute? Will President Carter be laid to rest at Arlington National Ceremony? He served in the Navy. He is eligible for burial in a national cemetery. That got me to thinking, I wonder how many veterans know they are eligible for burial in a national cemetery? This burial benefit extends to the veterans' spouse and dependents. In addition, this benefit, extends to service-members who died while on active duty. 
